I have served them well for those many years, but I am now in need of an upgrade. Buildings, whether homes, businesses, or places of worship, all need repairs, replacement, and revitalization after many years of service. That time has come for me.

I have welcomed grandchildren and great-grandchildren through my doors, and have watched as lifelong partners lovingly cared for each other as mobility issues became increasingly difficult. My walls have resounded with the music of the big bands, late night television shows, daytime game shows, and the laughter of family. They have also absorbed the silent nighttime tears after the loss of a spouse, sibling or friend. My walls offer rest, relaxation, reassurance and independent living for seniors in St. Paul. People who share a birthplace with Charles Schultz of "Snoopy" fame have tread on my carpets. Through my windows, the beauty of the changing of the leaves, and the first snowfall of winter have been viewed and appreciated.

My friends who live here come from all walks of life and have contributed to society in various ways. Here they are embraced as the face of Christ,

accompanied with dignity, and loved as family. Sometimes it is necessary for these friends to accept the fact that independent living is no longer a viable option, and then they are welcomed into the adjacent building where they receive the additional care they need from the Little Sisters.

Providing for the safety and security of my friends is very important, but time takes a toll on the a building. Lighting, windows, energy efficient appliances, safe and accessible sinks and showers - as well as a facelift of painting and wallpaper - are now being completed. The upgraded Nurse-Call System will bring a greater sense of security to all who inhabit my hallways.

I am an integral part of the Holy Family Residence. I am proud of how I have served this community for over three decades. Now I need your help so that I can continue to be a dependable, safe and secure Home. I am hoping that you will consider being a Christmas Angel to help with this very important project. LIVE A THANKFUL LIFE QUILT

Ruth Knable, a 12-year Resident of the Jeanne Jugan Apartments, is a mom, grandmother, and a quilter. She has been sewing since she was 15, but did not begin quilting until the 1990s. Quilting provided Ruth a new way of using her fabrics, as well as a chance to cultivate another talent.

A friend sent her an email about a 2020 summer "Block of the Week" wool appliquéd project, and convinced Ruth to sign up, even though this style was new to her. She would receive a weekly packet of wool and a pattern to follow. She worked each day for 2-6 hours beginning in July of 2020, and finishing the project in March of 2021. Ruth is grateful that her work kept her safe and sane during the unforeseen isolation brought on by COVID-19, of the summer, fall and winter months.

Ruth photographed her progress on the quilt and shared photos with a good friend who finally convinced her that she needed to enter in the Minnesota State Fair. The friend's hunch was correct because Ruth was awarded Second Place for her beautiful creation! The quilt is now being prominently displayed and admired by her larger family of the Little Sisters of the Poor at Holy Family Residence. **Congratulations Ruth!**
