'I wanted to give them the best care'

Not long after that, an opening for a nurse's position was available and that was the beginning of a lifetime of service to the elderly at our Home.

Bonnie feels gratitude and love for the staff and Little Sisters and how well "we all work and fit together for the well-being of our Residents."

She is touched by how the nursing team and other staff members treat each Resident with respect as well as show interest in what the Resident might need.

Bonnie is looking forward to retirement, including spending special time with her two granddaughters.

Bonnie came back to join the Residents and Sisters for the annual May Crowning. She was honored to crown the Blessed Mother at the Mass held on May 13. This was the first time an employee was given this honor.

MEET BROTHER PAUL

'The Lasallian charism at work'

Brother Paul Louis Grass was born and raised on the East Side of St. Paul.

Brother Paul attended Sacred Heart School from Kindergarten through eighth grade and was superbly educated by the Sisters of Notre Dame. He enrolled at Cretin High School in August 1948.

The enjoyment and success he experienced at Cretin, Brother Paul says, "...are primarily because of the individual Christian Brothers who taught me during the four years. Their uniqueness and expertise in every classroom and their unity of purpose and spirit impressed me."

Adding to the inspiration, at the end of his sophomore year, Pope Pius XII declared Saint John Baptist de La Salle as Patron Saint of All Teachers of Youth.

Brother Paul received the religious habit as a Brother of the Christian Schools on Dec. 14, 1952. Perpetual profession took place at Beaver Island, Michigan, on June 26, 1959.

The first two assignments as a Christian Brother were as a teacher and chorus director at secondary schools in Texas and Illinois. Brother Paul held

and Illinois. Brother Paul held various university administrative positions from July 1967 through June 1988, and earned a PhD in 1970 from Michigan State University. He was the Regional Coordinator of Christian Brothers Conference from 1988-1991 and worked from 1991-1997 as the Secretary General of the Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools in the Generalate Community in Rome, Italy. He served as executive director of Lasallian Publications in Winona, MN, from 1998 to 2010, focusing on translating all of St. John Baptist de La Salle's original writings into English.

A significant moment in Brother Paul's life as a Christian Brother was the 1973 session of CIL (Centro Internazionale Lasalliano) at the Casa Generalizia in Rome, Italy. He was introduced to "... inspiring experts and scholars who dedicated their lives to researching the origins of the Institute

of the Brothers of the Christian Schools and the life of the Founder, Saint John Baptist de La Salle (1651-1719). I learned the deeper story of the vocation, the spirit of faith and the inspiration of De La Salle and the early Brothers."

He continued, "The spirit of faith, the presence of God, the needs of poor people, the quality of teaching and the

building of the community of believers in Lasallian schools are as important as ever. The expansion over time of the role of all who are baptized in educating the young is evident in the worldwide Lasallian network of schools where only 2% or 3% of the teachers are vowed religious members. The Holy Spirit and the Lasallian charism are at work."

The advice Brother
Paul would give someone
considering a vocation of
service to the Church today
is, "The charism of Saint
John Baptist de La Salle
is producing results. The
Brothers with De La Salle
looked about them with the
eyes of faith, supported by
personal and community
prayer and the Gospel, saw
what young people were

lacking, what they needed and how to help them. The same process can occur today in your individual life."

Brother Paul had cousins who lived in the Homes of the Little Sisters in Chicago and Indianapolis. His mom, Mary (Kohn) Grass, lived at Holy Family Residence from 1994-1996 and he knew of retired Brothers who lived here as well.

Based on the advice of the Brothers, personal experience and a recent medical diagnosis, Brother Paul came to live in our Home this year. He reflected, "This community of caring is God's providential blessing for me."

MEET BROTHER JAMES

'Independent living with a chapel for daily Mass'

Brother James Rosak was born in South St. Paul.


He went to St. Augustine's grade school and then to Cretin High School, taught by the De La Salle Christian Brothers. His mother instilled the value of education as a priority saying, "I don't care if you dig ditches for a living. I want you to be able to carry yourself and express yourself in public whenever the need arises."

Brother James said, "The Brothers who taught us at Cretin expected us to study and to demonstrate self-control, while granting we were boys. I found them to be knowledgeable teachers and a caring lot. Brother Timothy, my senior homeroom moderator and American History teacher, sat me down one day and said he thought I could make a good Brother. I liked the idea of engaging in some work bigger than myself. Brother Timothy's invitation won the day. My mother was pleased but exerted no pressure; my father was dubious, thinking I would not stay the course."

Shortly after graduating from Cretin, Brother James entered the novitiate in Glencoe, Missouri on June 13, 1952. He received the habit August 30, 1952 and took his first vows a year later.

He continued his education earning a B.A. at St. Mary's College

in Winona, MN, and earned state certification to teach English, math and Latin at the high school level, along with philosophy and religion.



liked the idea of engaging in some work bigger than myself."

He also earned credits in high school administration and was a chief administrator or principal three times. He specialized in English curriculum, linguistics, classical literature and old and middle English. He also taught in Kenya and Mexico.

Advice Brother James would offer

someone considering a vocation of service to the Church includes the following: "I would ask what Church means to them. If they say the Church is us, we would talk of the way God is real to us, of what God is asking us to do, and we would be an old seeker sharing with a young seeker."

Many Brothers living in St. Paul have benefitted from the care of the Little Sisters of the Poor over the years. Brother James would visit them and "see the freshness and almost monastic sense of the spaces, not crowded with anxious, bewildered old folk I often saw in elder homes." He appreciated the option of "independent

living in an apartment with ready access to the assisted living facility, and importantly to me, the chapel for daily Mass."

When his younger brother was dying of cancer, Brother James returned to St. Paul from Memphis.

After five years in an independent apartment, Brother James applied and was happy to be accepted at Holy Family Residence. That, in his words, "was the beginning of another period of the rod falling on a pleasing site.
